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A Summer Day of Stitching Together In Person!! by Helen O'Connor, Retreat Coordinator



e are excited to tell you that we've decided to have a one day stitching retreat Saturday, August 21st, (rain date 8/28) at Ararat in Greenville, the venue we have been using for a long time. We normally would have a three or four day retreat, of course, but these are not normal times. Instead of using the dining room, we are going to use the outdoor Pavilion, which seats many people, and has plenty of room for

everyone to sit comfortably, either at a table alone or, if one chooses, with friends. I'm told there are plenty of electrical outlets. Masks are optional and there is no vaccination requirement. We will be outdoors.

You can arrive as early as 9:00 a.m. and stay as late as 7:00 p.m. The cost for the day is \$25.00. You need to bring your usual stitching supplies, lighting, magnification, and chair cushion or special chair if you want one. There are two restrooms behind the Pavilion, and there's another one near the dining room as well. You can either bring your own food, or elect to eat the optional Barbeque lunch that will be offered at <u>an additional cost of</u> <u>\$29.50</u>, which includes the tip. The Barbeque menu consists of Angus burgers, 100% beef hot dogs, fresh grilled sausage, corn on the cob, potato, macaroni and pasta salads, and desserts of cookies or sheet cake. We need to have a minimum of 15 people for the Retreat, and 25 for the Barbeque.

Please complete the <u>coupon</u> on Page 7 and send it, along with your check, made payable to NYCDCEGA, by July 1, 2021 to Louise Butler at the address listed on the <u>coupon</u>.

I hope many of you will be able to come. This is a toe-dipping-into-the-water event, to get

us ready to meet in person again, which I know we all want so badly to be able to do. After we have the requisite number of participants, I will send out an email to them with more information, including specific directions to the venue.

Why You Need A Little Yellow in Your Life by Jacquie Clarkson



Jacquie Clarkson is an accomplished stitcher and needlework teacher! She has her Journeyman Level II in the Master Teacher Programme of ANG. Her teaching experience includes EGA, ANG, Quilt guilds in both Canada and the USA, a Fine Arts college in Ontario, historical museums in both Canada and the USA, Cyber-workshops for ANG, an upcoming online workshop in Sashiko in 2021 for EGA, Studio Time at Callaway Gardens as well as Region seminars for EGA, numerous lectures on Threads, and lectures on the historical aspects of different needlework.

In addition, Jacquie has designed projects for national thread and fabric companies over the years. She has also created, as part of a group, articles for ANG, designed projects for national magazines and needlework books, studied with Elizabeth Elvin while she was principal of the Royal School of Needlework, volunteered for different executive spots for local EGA and ANG guilds, been an executive at the Region Level of EGA and National Level for ANG, and was a partner in a needlework shop called the Heart of the Needle for 8 years. What tends to follow through on most of her work is texture. She loves texture and how it looks on a piece.

Your piece can be any type of stitching—cross stitch, needlepoint, crewel, etc. It should be either an original design, or an adaptation of a commercial design.


There are lots of designers who have shared freebies related to the pandemic. Find one and make it your own! Reflect on what you were thinking, or feeling, or anything



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Grant's Funky Slippers Get A New Life by Terry Case, Outreach



Recreated slippers

As many of you know, President Ulyesses S. Grant spent the last few weeks of his life in a cottage near Milton, NY. That Cottage is now a State Historic Site open for visits and tours in the summer.

Last fall, Amanda Massie, who works at Grant's Cottage, contacted the Outreach Committee and asked if we could create slippers similar to ones Grant was wearing in a photograph taken at the Cottage. The picture was sent out to members for consideration and the consensus was that the slippers were probably felt with needlepoint on the uppers. Two Chapter members, Dawna Johnson and Louise Butler, volunteered to create them. Dawna made the felt slippers and Louise stitched the needlepoint using a Scotch

stitch and then attached the canvas to the felt. As you can see by the pictures, the results were fantastic! We owe a big thank you to both Dawna and Louise.

The slippers were submitted to the Cottage staff in late April. The only addition were leather soles attached by the conservators at Peebles Island. Everyone was pleased with the results and the slippers are to be shown in a display case during the summer with credit given to the Chapter.

We plan to have a trip to the Cottage in the summer for any interested members. Stay tuned for plans, dates, etc.

UFO Challenge 2021-2022

What is a UFO? No, we are not referring to Unidentified Flying Objects! In the needlework world, UFO refers to an UnFinished Object. If you are anything like me, you have many of them languishing somewhere in a closet. Or perhaps you've dusted off a few since the Pandemic started last year. We would like to see everyone complete their UFOs, so we are offering a UFO Challenge to our members!

- \Rightarrow You may register up to 5 UFOs started before 2020.
- \Rightarrow UFOs must be less than 50% completed at the beginning of the Pandemic, i.e., March/April 2020.
- \Rightarrow Fill out the coupon on <u>Page 7</u> to register your UFOs and email it to Evelyn Greenstein.
- ⇒ Your UFOs need to have all stitching completed, but do not need to be finished (framed, box top, pillow, etc.*)
- \Rightarrow Each time you finish a UFO, let Evelyn Greenstein know that it is done, and e-mail her a picture.
- \Rightarrow UFOs must have stitching completed and an e-mail of completion sent to the coordinator by April 1, 2022.
- ⇒ For each finished UFO, you will be entered into a drawing for a \$25 gift certificate to a needlework shop.
- \Rightarrow 3 Winners will be announced at our May 2022 Joint meeting.

* Although finishing is not required to be entered in the drawing, we would love to see your pieces fully finished to be displayed at our next Exhibit.

Help Create the World's Largest Band Sampler

World Embroidery Day was set up in 2011 in Sweden by a passionate group of stitchers who felt that this wonderful art should be acknowledged and celebrated. Since then, people around the world have come up with all sorts of ways to celebrate each **July 30th**.

This year, the San Francisco School of Needlework and Design (SNAD) has an ongoing project to create the world's longest Band Sampler! They are asking anyone who is interested to stitch a band that will be incorporated into their sampler. You may use any type of ground fabric – i.e., linen, evenweave, canvas, congress cloth, etc. You may use any type of stitching technique you like. They would like you to incorporate your name, where you live, and any other info you might like to include. Your fabric must measure 7" high x 11" wide. The design must be no larger than 5" high x 9" wide, which allows for a one inch seam all around. This is an ongoing project with no set due date. The Mysteries and Allure of the Bayeux Tapestry by Trudi Jacobson, Education Chair

First, let's clear up one basic fact. The Bayeux Tapestry, that remarkable piece of textile art that has survived since the 1100s, isn't a tapestry at all. It is an amazing work of crewel embroidery, using wool threads on linen fabric.

Here are the fundamentals about the Bayeux Tapestry:

- It records the events leading up to William of Normandy's conquest of England by defeating Harold, newly crowned King of England, during battle in 1066.
- It is enormously long: almost 231 feet of linen cloth in sections of various lengths, though initially it was longer, as there is a piece missing.
- It is narrow, at just under 20".
- It is located in Bayeux and hasn't left France since it was initially brought there, presumably in the 11th or 12th century.

- Four stitches were used: stem and couching stitch predominate, with chain stitch and two-yarn split stitch used more rarely. The couching stitch is now known as Bayeux stitch (Lemagnen, p. 16).
- The wool was probably dyed in the wool to create the seven colors used, with the dyes coming from plants: terra cotta (madder), blue and very dark blue (woad), yellow (weld), buff, blue-green, and dark green (mixtures of weld and woad) (Snook, p. 14, Lemagnen, p.15).
- It has three horizontal sections: the middle section tells the story and has a terse commentary in Latin. The smaller top and bottom borders include animals, birds, and anecdotal scenes.
- The motifs in the borders were borrowed from images found on woven silks from the eastern Mediterranean area. Using these motifs associated with a more luxurious medium would have enhanced the value of Tapestry for its first viewers (Hicks, p.18).

Beyond these facts, there are mysteries and cliffhangers attached to it. It is also a living document!

The primary mystery is how it came to be created. It tells the story of a Norman conquest and resides in a museum in France, and yet it is sympathetic to the English. For many years, it was thought that Queen Mathilda, William's wife, commissioned the work. That view has been discredited. Many now believe that William's younger half-brother Odo arranged for the work to be designed by monks skilled at book illumination and stitched by embroiderers in a workshop near Canterbury. However, Carola Hicks, in her book *The Bayeux Tapestry: The Life Story of a Masterpiece*, suggests that it was Edith Godwinson, the widow of the recently deceased King Edward, the sister of King Harold, and a friend of the new King William, who was behind the creation of the tapestry. She had the "motive, means, and opportunity" and is the only contender for the role of patron who had expertise in embroidery (Hicks, p. 29-30).

The further mysteries of where it was created, when, and who stitched it are all tied up with the primary question of who commissioned it. What is known is that it is documented as being in the Bayeux Cathedral in 1476. Each year during a July feast week, it was displayed around the nave, while at other times, it was kept in a chest in the Cathedral's treasury. And yet, why is it in Bayeux since there is no direct connection? Where was it between its creation and 1476? Bridgeford speculates that it might have been kept in the crypt of the Bayeux Cathedral for safekeeping, but access to the crypt was blocked from the early 12th century until 1412. Being inaccessible would have kept it safe from harm during those tumultuous centuries (Bridgeford, p. 302).

The tapestry has had some dicey moments ... (STAY TUNED: to be continued in the Fall issue)
