stitching room has incredible daylight, with huge windows on both sides of the very large room. We'll sit at our tables in one part of this space, and when the breakfast, lunch or dinner bell rings, we just get up and move to a different part of the room. The site itself is simply beautiful, with a view of the Catskill Mountains. It is a wonderful place to walk around and, depending on the weather, there is a tennis court and outdoor pool. The main residence has a large, central living room with a television and DVD player.

Dates: The retreat dates are September 9–11.

Location: Ararat Center in Greenville, NY, just off Route 32, 18 miles south of Delmar.

Meals: The weekend starts with dinner on Friday, and includes all meals through lunch on Sunday. Snacks will be served every evening. Coffee, tea, hot chocolate, juices and water are included and available throughout the day, often with fresh fruit. Breakfast and lunch are served on Sunday and the retreat will end at 3:00 pm Sunday.

Costs: The retreat costs include all meals and meal gratuities. Housekeeping gratuities are up to the individual participant.

• Friday–Sunday: \$306 for a single; \$246 for a double; and \$222 for a triple.

Registration for day trippers will open once we meet the minimum number of weekend attendees. At that point, I will send out an email with meal costs and other details.

Reintroducing In-Person Meetings



Deerfield Society of Blue and White Needlework

Not far from here, in the Memorial Hall Museum in Deerfield, Massachusetts, there is a wonderful collection of embroidered items by members of the Deerfield Society of Blue and White Needlework. You may be familiar with their work through a visit to Memorial Hall or from the book *Deerfield Embroidery* by Margery Burnham Howe.

The Society of Blue and White Needlework was founded in 1896 by Ellen Miller and Margaret Whiting, both of whom were from New England and former students of art in New York City. Their families both moved to Deerfield in the mid-1890s but they had met each other previously. Indeed, they had already collaborated on a comprehensive book, *Wild Flowers of the North-Eastern States* (1895), illustrated with pen and ink drawings. In Deerfield, they became interested in early- to mid-18th century embroidered textiles stored at Memorial Hall. They also sought out early embroidered pieces as they traveled around the area seeking locations for landscape paintings.

Miller and Whiting's goal was to revive Colonial-era needlework so that these skills would not be lost. They decided to develop a village industry, aided by Ellen's younger sister Margaret Miller, who became the secretary for the society, and Mary Allen, who, with her sister Frances, became a nationally known photographer. Miller and Whiting's designs were their own, inspired by but not copied from 18th-century designs. They trained local women to embroider their designs, using linen cloth and predominantly linen threads. Ellen Miller became skilled at dyeing, using not synthetic dyes, but natural ones (see photo). Originally the designs used blue thread only (see example in photo), but influences beyond the Colonial began to make their way into the work, as Whiting described in an 1898 talk: "Rub Oriental art through a Puritan sieve and how odd the result; how charming and individual" (Howe, p. 18). The



stitches were those used by 18th-century embroiderers, linear stitches such as outline, stem, herringbone, Deerfield herringbone, open and closed chain, coral, and more (Flynt, p. 77).



Women who embroidered items as a part of the Deerfield Society of Blue and White Needlework were paid based on the selling price of an item. The amount was divided into ten parts. The craftsperson was given five parts, Whiting or Miller earned two parts as the designer, two parts were put in a fund to maintain the society, and one part covered the cost of materials (Cahill, p. 73). Works from the Society were identified by the letter "D" within a spinning wheel.

The Blue and White Society was just one of a number of Arts & Crafts movements established towards the end of the nineteenth century and during the first two decades of the 20th. Particularly famous was the William Morris workshop in England, others include the Wiener Werkstätte in Austria, the Roycroft community in western New York, the Prairie School of architecture in Chicago, and, right in Deerfield itself, the Deerfield Society of Arts and Crafts. This society was made up of basketmakers, weavers, photographers, and those who worked with metals.

Whiting and Miller began to enter Society works into exhibitions around the country, including five items in the first Chicago Arts and Crafts Society exhibition, which resulted in a number of orders (Flynt, p. 77). The work was also shown in arts and craft society exhibitions in Detroit, Boston, New Orleans, and elsewhere. At the 1915 World's Fair in San Francisco, one of their works won a silver medal for color and design. It is also possible that Whiting won a gold medal. While there is no record of this accomplishment, she did have in her possession a gold medal from the fair (Flynt, p. 102). The work of the Society slowed down around this period. During the First World War, it was difficult to get linen, and members of the Society were focused on other endeavors. The Society hung on until 1926, when it disbanded due to changing tastes and the declining health of Whiting and Miller.
