Check Washing: A Cautionary Tale

AVE YOU EVER GOTTEN INK from a ballpoint pen on your shirt and used hair spray to get it off?

If so, then you understand how check washing works. A fraudster gets ahold of a check you wrote and uses chemicals to remove the ink. Just like your shirt, the check is now ink-free. And the fraudster is free to write in new information. A really talented fraudster can wash your check of everything but your signature. A less talented one takes a picture of the check before washing it and then tries to forge your signature.

So ... how do you prevent check washing?

Don't use a ballpoint pen when writing checks. Use a black gel ink pen instead. The gel ink soaks into the check fibers, so it is harder for a fraudster to chemically remove it. And using black makes it even more likely for residue to be left behind. It's not impossible to wash black gel ink off a check. But it's difficult enough that most fraudsters won't bother.

How does check washing work in real life?

Well, sadly, we know because it just happened to our Chapter. Fortunately, our bank returned the stolen money to our account. But it took some effort.

And what exactly happened?

In August, I wrote a check for the deposit for our September retreat and mailed it to Helen. I emailed her so she'd know to look for it. It didn't arrive, so Helen emailed me. I put a stop payment on the check and wrote a new one. Which I had someone hand deliver to her.

In October, I was preparing the monthly Treasurer's Report to the Board. And I saw a check on the statement for an amount that didn't match any amounts I had written. It was the missing check, with the stop payment. And an amount ten times higher than what I had originally written it for. I looked at the check image: different date, different payee, different amount. Even the signature was different.

I immediately called the bank. That was on a Monday. By that Friday, the Bank had refunded us both the stolen money and the stop payment fee. (You might be thinking, "Why didn't the stop payment work?" Because the bank's computer system was looking for the check number and the original amount, not just the check number. Since the amount was different, the stop payment didn't work.)

The Bank was concerned that the fraudsters now had our bank account number and the routing number, from the check they had successfully cashed. So they first put a hold on the account, preventing any withdrawals from it. Then they had us close it out and open a new one. The Bank paid for the checks for the new account. So the Chapter didn't lose anything from this experience.

We have, however, gained some valuable knowledge about how to prevent check washing:

- 1) Keep tabs on checks you have written, in case one goes missing.
- 2) Put a stop payment on any missing checks. (Even though the stop payment didn't prevent the fraudulent check, it did help us prove that the check was fraudulent, so we got our money back faster).
- 3) Keep an eye on your account, especially if you have online access, so you can identify fraudulent transactions as soon as they happen.
- 4) And most importantly: use a black gel ink pen when writing checks.

Among the forms I filled out to get the money refunded was one authorizing the Bank to investigate the fraud and, if possible, refer the case to law enforcement. If I learn anything, I'll let everyone know. But even if the fraudsters are never caught, our Chapter didn't lose any money.

Walk-through Tours: Saturday-Sunday, noon–2:30 pm (about 30 minutes). Tours are free but advance registration is recommended as spaces are limited.



Volunteers Needed for Sampler Reproduction

Our friend Sarah Stevens, the conservator from Peebles Island, has been tasked with reproducing a sampler from one of the Hudson River mansions near Kingston. The sampler is starting to deteriorate and she turned to us for help in stitching a reproduction suitable for display.

The sampler is 17 inches by 17 inches and appears to be on 28 ct linen. It's about 240 stitches square. We'll reproduce it on linen in either silk or DMC.

The project has two phases. The first phase would be charting the original. The challenge here is that the charting has to be done by April 2024. The second phase would be stitching the sampler, but that does not have to be done until 2026.

The immediate need is for volunteers to copy the sampler stitches onto embroidery graph paper. Due to space constrictions, we can only have two people a day — one working the top and one the bottom. It's rather labor intensive so the sooner we get started the better. If you're interested in this part of the project, please contact Terry Case.

EDUCATION OPPORTUNITIES FROM EGA NATIONAL

EGA National offers quite a variety of online learning opportunities. This column presents information about three types: online studio classes, virtual education courses (a new option), and the virtual lecture series, which is up to lecture 35 with the first one listed below.

Online Studio Classes

These classes allow you to access and download your course materials from the EGA site. You also have the option to engage with your classmates and ask questions of your instructor on the class discussion forum. The next class that will come live is Mushroom Advanced Box Making with Emma Broughton. Registration runs from January 3 to February 7 and the class is from April 3 to May 22, 2024.

Virtual Education Courses

There is a new type of educational offering debuting early next year. EGA has announced Virtual Education Courses. They promote the virtual nature of these offerings: "By staying in the comfort of your own home, you won't have to deal with airline issues, nor pay for a hotel. And even though you're not in a classroom together, you will still enjoy the companionship of stitching with other like-minded members." The first of these courses takes place February 22-24, 2024. Virtual Education Course: Queen Catherine's Book Cover, Bag, and Pyn Pillow with Carolyn Standing Webb. Unfortunately, the course is now full, but there is a link to sign up for the waiting list on the page linked above.
