Dorsett Buttons

Taught by Sandie Feck

Nov 18, 2026

Dorset buttons are traditional, hand-crafted thread buttons originating from Dorset, England, characterized by a covered ring foundation, radial spoke threads, and intricate woven or stitched geometric fillings. They date back to the 17th century when local cottage industries made them using horn molds and sheep's wool.

Sandie Feck will be leading a class on making these fun, decorative buttons. Sandie will supply the rings to be used and the participants will supply the threads and usual stitching supplies.

President's Corner

First off, let me say that I am excited to serve as Chapter President. I have enjoyed being a member, and I am looking forward to continuing our Chapter's mission to "set and maintain high standards of design, color, and workmanship in all kinds of embroidery and canvas work."

One of my first actions was to send out a survey to the membership, to better understand who we are and what we want from the Chapter. We had 20 responses, which is extremely good for an online survey. The survey is officially closed, but if you have thoughts about the Chapter you want to share, contact me. I have an email address I am using as Chapter President, so things don't get lost in my personal email account.

The first question asked about length of membership, with 20% having been a member for less than 5 years, 15% having been a member for 5 to 10 years, and 65% having been a member for more than 10 years. That's a great mix, it and tells us that folks who join tend to stay. And also that new folks are joining us, which is good for the long-term survival of the Chapter.

One of the benefits of belonging to EGA is the ability to meet with other stitchers, including those who are interested in the same techniques as you. The survey, therefore, asked about both the general groups (Beverwyck, Day Group, and North End) and the special interest groups (Blackwork, Counted Thread (day), Counted Thread (evening), Crewel & Surface Embroidery, Needlepoint, and Whitework). There is more information about each of these elsewhere in the newsletter, and we will have presentations about each of the special interest groups at our Meet & Greet. The general groups – as the name sounds – are open to any stitching technique, as well as open to the public. They are a great way to check us out before joining, so be sure to let your non-EGA stitching friends know. The special interest groups are each focused on a single technique (or collection of related techniques), indicated by the name. These are only for Chapter members.

Overall, folks seem to be pleased with the offerings, both the general groups and the special interest groups. Each group had at least a few respondents who regularly attend, and a couple of folks even offered to help. I will be sharing those names with the group leaders.

Another benefit of belonging to the EGA is the opportunity to take classes. Everyone who responded to the survey had taken at least one class, whether through our Chapter, another chapter, the Metropolitan Region, another EGA region, or EGA National. Regularly check the EGA National website (<https://egausa.org/courses-overview/>) and the Metropolitan Region website (<https://metroega.org/programs/>) for classes on offer. Our newsletter and emails will let you know about classes on offer from us. I will be sharing suggestions for classes and workshops with the Program Committee to consider. And you should consider joining the Program Committee: these folks are the ones who identify and plan the classes, lectures, and other events offered to Chapter members. They can always use help (especially if you enjoy handling logistics!).

There are a whole lot more benefits to belonging to the EGA than attending meetings and taking classes. For example, the EGA National website has over 60 Petite Projects, small projects that *(continued on page 6)*

Remembering Terry Case

Terry's gift to our chapter wasn't just the many donated pieces of needlework given to us by her family, but her shared love of needlework. She was always interested in whatever we were stitching, and her words of encouragement helped many of us along the way.

We were all part of the family Terry cared about, and she'll be remembered not only as a valued and enthusiastic member of EGA, but also for the varied positions she held in our chapter and for her willingness to teach numerous classes. Over the years, Terry served as chapter president, and as chair of our outreach and program committees. For over twenty years she coordinated and led our Beverwyck meetings, and she assumed responsibility for our annual Christmas tree display at Beverwyck for their residents, decorated with stitched ornaments donated by chapter members.

Terry was our liaison with the New York State Bureau of Historic Sites and Parks at Peebles Island, where she and other members worked on historic embroidery projects, such as charting and stitching the reproduction Senate House sampler, sewing curtains for the Staatsburg State Historic Site, and recreating President Grant's embroidered slippers.

Her special interests were whitework and counted thread—especially images of birds!—and she loved stitching intricate samplers, many of which are included in our silent auction. Please consider bidding on one or more of Terry's beautiful pieces as a reminder of her special place in the chapter, and in our hearts. I'm sure Terry would be happy to know her work will hang in the homes of people she cared about, and who have shared in her embroidery journey.

Our annual Meet & Greet will be held on September 26, 2026 at the Glenville Senior Center, located at 32 Worden Road, Glenville, NY, from 11 am – 3 pm.

This is a BYOL (Bring Your Own Lunch) event. If you want to bring a dessert to share, please contact Maryann Gibson. Coffee, tea, and water will be provided.

This year, we will have a special silent auction of Terry Case's finished needlework at our Meet and Greet. We have been given 35 framed pieces and several finished but unframed pieces, by Terry's family, and many of them will be available for bidding. We plan to have photos and details for each piece available to members before the Meet and Greet. Members who cannot make it to the meeting will be able to submit proxy bids in advance for pieces they are interested in. The starting bid for each piece will be \$25, and money collected will go to the chapter. Bidding will be in \$5 increments. We will be accepting cash, check, or credit card (nominal processing fee) for payment.

There will be a Swap Table, so bring any charts or small needlework-related items that you might like to leave for someone else's enjoyment. Then check out the table and see if there's anything you'd like to take. There is no requirement to bring anything, and if something catches your eye, you may take it.

Our SIG (Special Interest Groups) leaders will each be giving a short presentation on the type of stitching their particular groups does. They may have some examples of the technique they use, and will let us know if they have any upcoming projects planned for their group.

ARRIVAL OF SPRING: A GAIL STAFFORD DESIGN



NY Capital District Chapter is pleased to announce that we have contracted with Gail Stafford to teach her class Arrival of Spring. There will be four Zoom sessions, approximately 45 minutes each, on Feb 27, Mar 6, 13, 20, 2027, at 10am. Don't miss out on the opportunity to take this fun class with a National teacher!

The Chapter is subsidizing part of the teaching fee for our chapter members. The fee for Chapter members is \$115 (kit \$95 + teaching fee \$20). Region members are invited to take this class as well. The fee for Region members is \$140 (kit \$95 + teaching fee \$45). **Deadline to register is Nov 1, 2026.** (See coupon on page 9.)

On a walk in the neighborhood, who wouldn't notice this beautiful yard and its lovely gazebo? This scene celebrates the arrival of spring with its fresh green grass, flowering white azaleas, the dogwood tree in full bloom, and new leaves on the red maple. Participants will learn to paint the unstitched sky. They will use a variety of over-dyed threads, stranded embroidery cotton, and some thread blending to stitch this neighborhood scene. Canvas stitches include Cashmere, Nobuko, Criss-Cross Hungarian and more. A few sharp needle techniques are used including the Outline Stitch and Lazy Daisies.

Finished design size: 5" x 7" — Level: Intermediate

Kit includes

- Congress cloth, 10" by 12", with transferred design
- #24 tapestry and #24 Chenille needles
- All threads needed to complete the project
- Detailed instruction booklet

Supply List

- Stretcher bars, 10" x 12"
- Laying tool
- All-purpose craft paintbrush with approximately 3/8" flat tip width
- Bottle white acrylic craft paint
- Bottle blue acrylic craft paint
- Plus usual items needed for stitching

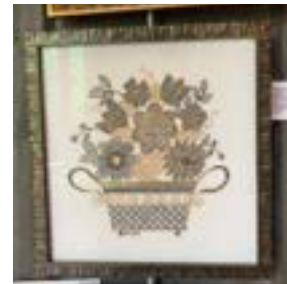
